CAREER PATHS

To enlist in the US Army, entrants must be at least 17 years old, have a high-school diploma or General Educational Development (GED), and be a citizen or permanent resident of the US. They also need to pass a physical and written exam, background check, and drug test. Specialized positions may need additional qualifications.

HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATE You need a high-school diploma, a GED, or 15 or more college credits to enlist in the Army.

COLLEGE GRADUATE A

four-year college degree is required for some roles, such as officer. For certain specialized careers, such as in the medical field, you need a master's degree.

ARMY SOLDIER Once recruited, you begin with Basic Combat Training (BCT), which teaches skills needed to perform essential Army duties. After BCT, you must complete Advanced Individual Training (AIT) to learn specialized skills for specific Army jobs.



INTELLIGENCE ANALYST Seeks out and analyzes information about the enemy to help inform battle strategy and assist troops serving on the battle front.



AVIONIC COMMUNICATIONS EQUIPMENT REPAIRER/ MECHANIC Member of the Army communications maintenance team. Responsible for performing repairs and maintenance on aircraft communications equipment.



NURSE CORPS OFFICER

Leads a team of Army Nurse Corps nurses who provide care and special services for soldiers and their families. Requires a bachelor's degree in nursing from an accredited school.

SKILLS GUIDE



Good communication skills with unit members, officers, and civilians at home and abroad.



The ability to work as a member of a close-knit team, follow rules, and have respect for authority.



Flexibility to adapt to frequently changing work environments and locations anywhere in the world.



Strong physical and mental fitness for taking part in land-force missions.



The perseverance to solve problems efficiently, sometimes in stressful and dangerous situations.
